Remembering Betty Baker



The Local History Group is deeply saddened to announce the death of Betty Baker. Betty, born in 1930, was 92 and one of our longest serving members. She joined u3a thirty years ago and was also a member of the walking group until she was eighty.

Betty was born in Nairn, a seaside resort on the Moray Firth, Scotland and spent most of her childhood on a nearby farm. She joined the Wrens (Women's Royal Naval Service) three years after the end of the War in 1948. It was this work that brought her to the Manchester area where she later worked as a telephonist at the main Manchester Telephone Exchange.

Over the years Betty researched many local topics for the group and it was only last year that she gave an interesting power-point talk on her life in Scotland during the War – comparing her experiences with the experiences of people in the Salford and Lancashire areas.

Her many friends will miss her kind and interesting conversation, her home-made shortbread and the marmalade which she made every year!

Betty is survived by her son and three grandchildren.
